## WHAT IS A RACES STATION?

A RACES station is an Amateur Radio station licensed to an Emergency Management organization, not an individual. The RACES station in Broward County is identified by the call WC4ACR.

### THE BROWARD COUNTY RACES PLAN

**This plan and its contents shall be reviewed every three (3) years after the latest approval date. Revisions and corrections will be supplied to all personnel and agencies involved.**

**Note! It is the responsibility of the local groups to cover communications within their jurisdiction within the guidelines of this countrywide plan. Changes in this RACES Communications Plan and any amendments will be submitted to the Division of Emergency Management for their approval.**

**In selecting the means of communications to be used, consideration should be given to the system most readily available and best able to provide the desired service. Telephones should always be used as a primary source of communications and all other types of communications will be used as back-up systems and will be utilized when telephone service becomes overloaded or disrupted. In many cases, radio will be the only means of communication available.**

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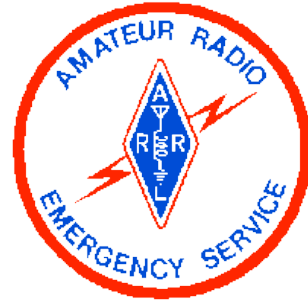

**SUPPORT PLAN**

**Introduction**

This attachment to annex ii provides the guidelines by which existing communications capabilities within Broward County may be enhanced by the use of radio amateurs and their equipment during an impending or existing disaster that threatens the county as a whole, a segment of the unincorporated area, or a municipality.

RACES may be activated any time of the day or any day of the year, Whenever the Emergency Management Division of Broward County, Public Safety Divisions or Disaster Relief Agencies requests emergency communications specialists. RACES does not only need a disaster response plan for the Hurricane Season (June 1, through November 30), but needs a disaster plan for a variety of natural and man made disasters. Hurricanes are low on the Disaster Probability Chart, because they are infrequent and generally provide advanced warning, thus giving plenty of lead time for all to prepare, including the evacuees. Severe weather disasters such as tornadoes, severe electrical storms, and even flooding are higher on the probability list than are hurricanes. These natural disasters cannot be predicted, may occur any time, and can range from very minor to catastrophic. The State of Florida can also experience earthquakes, (although the probability factor is extremely low, they can still occur) and all local and regional disaster plans prepare for them.

**Purpose**

- A. This plan is intended to provide a means of coordination between radio amateurs and county governments, service and welfare agencies.
- B. This plan enables agencies and organizations to include the amateur radio service in their emergency plans and programs.
- C. The purpose of this document is to explain the concept of operations of the Radio Amateur Civil Emergency Services (RACES) and the Amateur Radio Emergency Services (ARES). This plan is written with the need for keeping simplicity and flexibility in mind during disaster operations.



RACES, administered by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) of the United States government, is a part of the Amateur Radio Service that provides radio communications for Emergency Management purposes only, during periods of local, regional or national civil emergencies.

As defined in the FCC Rules and Regulations Part 97, Subpart E. RACES is a communications service, conducted by volunteer Federally licensed amateurs, designed to provide emergency communications to local or state emergency management agencies. RACES operation is authorized by the FCC at the request of a county, state or federal official, and this operation is limited to official emergency management activity. The Amateur Radio Emergency Service (ARES) consists of licensed radio amateurs who are registered to provide emergency and public service communications.

Although RACES and ARES originated as separate entities, in practice, this is a single group of people striving to provide quality emergency communications for the public.

A RACES/ARES Network is needed to supplement other emergency management communications systems. During natural or man made emergencies, it is essential that all channels of communications be available.

### **Agencies To Be Served**

The agencies to be served by this plan include the Broward County Emergency Management Division, American Red Cross, Municipal Governments, and all other approved organizations that may require communications assistance.

### **OPERATING GUIDELINES**

#### **Responsibilities**

- a. In the event of a hurricane, or other county-wide emergencies, amateur radio operators shall be responsible for emergency communications (see definition for Emergency Communications), for the following, not in order of priority:
  1. Evacuation assistance
  2. Shelter operations
  3. Special Care Facilities
  4. North Broward Hospital District

### **Membership**

Any licensed amateur radio operator meeting the current requirements is eligible for enrollment in RACES/ARES.

### **Identification (RACES/ARES)**

The method used to identify RACES/ARES volunteers is the Broward County Emergency Management Division photo I.D.

### **DEFINITIONS**

- a. Radio Amateur Civil Emergency Service (RACES): The volunteer radio communications division of the County Emergency Management Division.
- b. Amateur Radio Emergency Service (ARES): A nationwide organization of radio amateurs organized by the American Radio Relay League (ARRL).
- c. American Radio Relay League (ARRL): The nationwide organization of amateur radio operators which coordinates amateur field services in the United States.
- d. National Traffic System (NTS): A network the ARRL established for the passing of formal messages.
- e. Military Affiliated Radio System (MARS): An organization of radio amateurs who provide auxiliary communications for the military.
- f. RACES Officer (RO): Amateur radio operator appointed by the Broward County Emergency Management Division/Office of Information Technology as the leader of RACES in the Broward County RACES/ARES organization.
- g. ARES Emergency Coordinator (EC): Amateur radio operator appointed by the ARRL as the leader of ARES in the Broward County RACES/ARES organization.
- h. STORMSPOTTERS:

### **GENERAL DESCRIPTION**

This Radio Amateur Civil Emergency Service (RACES) Communications Plan is for the purpose of serving Broward County and its municipalities. Broward County has a population of approximately 1.2 million people and a land area of over 1196.9 square miles, 2/3 of which is occupied.

**AREAS SERVED**  
**Broward County**

- a. The call sign of the primary net control station is WC4ACR. It is located at the Broward County Emergency Operating Center 201 NW 84 Avenue Plantation, Florida 33317. The telephone number is (954) 831-3900.
- b. If communications are lost at the Broward County EOC, the secondary command communications center (Broward County Warning Point), will be emergency head quarters located the Broward Sheriff’s Building, 2601 West Broward Blvd. Fort Lauderdale Florida, 33313. The telephone number is (954) 765-5100 or (954) 765-4344

Assignment of operators and equipment will be based on availability and needs of the following (Not in order of priority):

- 1. EOC
- 2. Evacuation units
- 3. Red Cross
- 4. Special care shelters
- 5. City governments
- 6. Police departments
- 7. Fire departments
- 8. Hospitals
- 9. Other agencies

**Implementation Procedures**

- a. County Government

The Broward County Emergency Management Division or the Communications Officer shall be contacted upon determination by a responsible county government official of an emergency requiring county-wide communications support. The RACES Officer will be notified by either the Emergency Management Director or the Communications Officer and provided with the following information:

1. Nature of the incident;
2. Number of operators required;
3. Location of incident.

b. Municipal Government

Upon determination of an emergency of a local nature requiring communications support, the local official making such a determination shall contact the Broward County Warning Point at (954) 765-5100. The County Warning Point Duty officer will determine the necessity of a RACES/ARES activation.. (See part a. of this section).

c. All Emergency Needs

In the event that Broward County Emergency Management Division determines that the situation does not warrant a RACES activation, then the County Warning Point Duty Officer shall provide the ARES EC with the following information:

1. Nature of the incident;
2. Number of operators required;
3. Location of incident.

**BROWARD COUNTY COASTAL HURRICANE EVACUATION PLAN**

Broward County, Florida, lies in the path historically taken by storms and hurricanes. The potential destruction inherent with hurricanes imposes a grave responsibility.

Approximately twenty to thirty-five thousand people have been identified as transit dependent coastal area residents, or visitors, who have no other means, except public or privately operated transportation systems, of evacuating identified coastal risk areas. Communications will be coordinated between the Mass Transit Authority, Red Cross, Special Care Shelters, North Broward hospital district and the EOC.

In the mass transit plan of Broward County, the plan states that approximately one hundred seventy five (175) mass transit buses (actual number of buses will be based upon availability of buses and operators) have been committed to participate in the evacuation of transit dependent individuals residing in the areas of high risk.

Time frames for implementing and terminating an evacuation of high risk areas is for the worst probable threat for each storm category and are predicated upon the termination of evacuation operations prior to the arrival of sustained gale force winds (39 mph) and torrential rains that may inundate evacuation routes and prevent persons from evacuating areas vulnerable to storm surge.

## **SHELTER COMMUNICATIONS PLAN**

### 1. General

#### a. Purpose

To outline mutually agreed upon responsibilities and to establish policies and procedures which will provide effective, coordinated emergency communications between the Broward County Emergency Operations Center and the defined shelters, Red Cross headquarters, and the special care facilities.

#### b. Mission

To provide the county manager (Emergency Management Director) and his staff with accurate and timely information regarding the status of the shelters.

#### c. Situation

1. Metropolitan Broward County, because of its low coastal elevation, is particularly vulnerable to coastal flooding during hurricanes requiring the evacuation and sheltering of thousands of its residents in Red Cross shelters.
2. Other potential disasters such as tornadoes, passenger aircraft crashes, major explosions, fires, toxic chemical accidents, hazardous materials and civil disturbances could also cause sheltering of large number of victims.

### 2. Organization and responsibilities

#### a. Composition

1. Amateur radio personnel within Broward County have formed an Emergency Communications Planning Council for the purpose of developing necessary plans and assigning responsibilities for providing countywide volunteer communications to support local government disaster response efforts.

2. Net control for the countywide communications network will be WC4ACR located at the Broward County Emergency Operations Center.
  3. There will be a communications station in each shelter.
3. Concept of operations
- a. Opening of shelters
    1. Selection of shelters to be used and time of opening these shelters is determined jointly by the Red Cross and the Broward County School system.
    2. For hurricanes, shelters will normally be opened shortly after the National Hurricane center announces that a hurricane warning is in effect for Broward County.
  - b. Shelter communication stations
    1. The shelter manager will appoint their assistants who can authorize messages to be sent out through the radio operator. All messages will be routed through the shelter manager or their designee, in writing and signed.
    2. Upon activation of shelters, volunteer radio operators assigned to a specific shelter will report to their shelter manager and check into the net.

In the recovery phase of a hurricane, RACES/ARES volunteers will be assigned by the Emergency Management Division to aid in damage assessment, search and rescue, and the re-establishment of the community as communication duties permit.

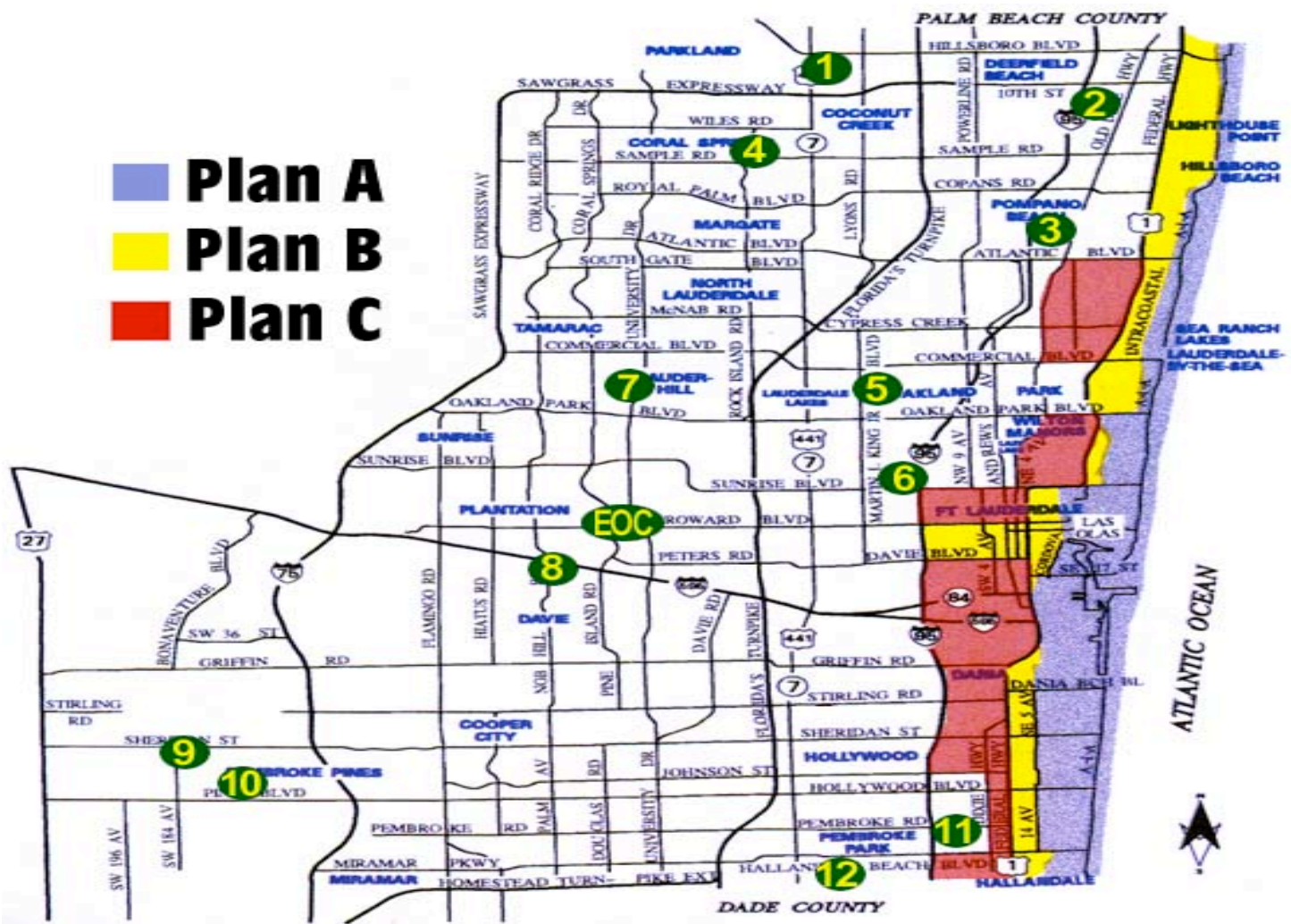

### **PLAN A**

1. The area east of the Intracoastal Waterway, south of the county line and north of Oakland Park Boulevard; and
2. The area east of Middle River Drive, south of Oakland Park Boulevard and north of Sunrise Boulevard and north of the New River; and
3. The area east of N.E. 16th Avenue, south of Sunrise Boulevard and north of the New River, and
4. The area east of Cordova Road, south of the New River and north of S.E. 17th Street.
5. The area east of Miami Road (South of S.E. 17th Street) and east of the U.S. 1 extension, south of S.E. 17th Street and north of Taylor Road.
6. The area east of N.E. 5th and S.E. 5th Avenue in Dania; N. and S. 14th Avenue in Hollywood, and N.E. 14th Avenue in Hallandale; south of Taylor Road, and North of Hallandale Beach Boulevard.
7. The area east of Layne Boulevard, south of Hallandale Beach Boulevard, and north of the county line.

### **PLAN B**

1. The area east of U.S. 1, south of the county line and north of Broward Boulevard; and
2. The area east of I-95 south of Broward Boulevard and north of Davie Boulevard.  
**Note:** the area south of Davie Boulevard and north of S.W. 24th Street (State Road 84) between S.W. 9th Avenue and U.S. 1, is excluded and does not have to be evacuated for the category of storm.
3. The area east of U.S. 1, south of S.W. 24th Street (State Road 84) and north of the county line.

### **PLAN C**

1. The area east of U.S. 1, south of the county line and north of Atlantic Boulevard; and
2. The area east Dixie Highway, south of Atlantic Boulevard and north of Commercial Boulevard; and
3. The area east of Wilton Drive N.E. 4th Avenue, south of Oakland Park Boulevard and north of Sunrise Boulevard; and
4. The area east of I-95, south Sunrise Boulevard and north of Johnson Street and north of Hallandale Beach Boulevard; and
5. The area east of Dixie Highway, south of Johnson Street and north Hallandale Beach Boulevard; and
6. The area east of I-95 south of Hallandale Beach Boulevard and north of the county line.

### **SPECIAL ADVISORY**

Those persons located outside of the mandatory evacuation zones but on a tidal body of water may need to evacuate for their safety.

All Tidal water bodies will rise and fall at the same rate as the ocean.
